EDMONTON - An 11-year-old boy who fought off a coyote to save his friend will be presented with a bravery award on Monday.

Marshall Davis was throwing snowballs in a northwest Edmonton backyard last November when a coyote came around the corner of the house with its teeth bared.

The animal bit his 10-year-old friend, David Burnett, several times in the leg before Marshall reached him.

He kicked and punched the coyote to fend off its attacks.

On Monday, Marshall will be one of 24 civilians and police officers in Alberta recognized by the Royal Canadian Humane Association for their heroism in the last year.

"We're probably more excited than he is. You know how parents are, right?" said his mom, Kerri Davis, on Friday as Marshall sat nearby on a couch.

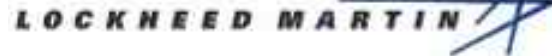

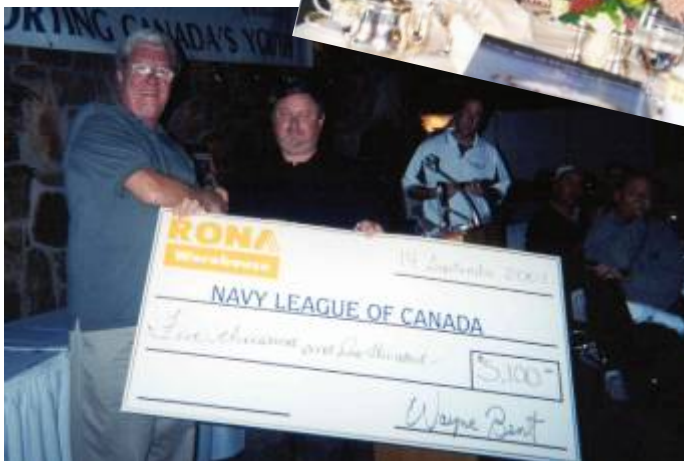
